

Meeting Minutes, February 16, 2023

President Sue Riley called the meeting to order at 10:04 a.m. followed by the flag salute.

Welcome/Sunshine: Doris reported we had 51 members and 6 guests present.

Recording Secretary: The January 19, 2023, meeting minutes were published in the newsletter; there were no corrections or additions. Karen A. made a motion to accept the minutes. Margaret seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Corresponding Secretary: No correspondence received.

Treasurer's Report: Beginning checkbook balance: \$15,947.88; Ending checkbook balance: \$16,534.09

Doris made a motion to accept the report as corrected. Becky E. seconded the motion. Motion passed. Phyllis audited the treasurer's books, which were found to be in order.

VP/Programs: Janet reported Georgia Goode will present today's program on owning a quilt shop. Following the business meeting there will be embroidery machine demonstrations by six members, along with a \$6 soup lunch. March 16 - Sue Marcotte will present a trunk show and, after the meeting, have a fabric postcard workshop (cost \$20, which will include lunch). April 20 - Arlene Arnold will present "The Journey from Kentucky to California" and hold a workshop the next day on her Lucretia's Journey quilt (cost \$25 including lunch). UFO forms are due by the March meeting.

Committee Reports:

Membership - 59 members have paid their dues (including 6 new members). The Membership Directories will be given out next month. Cradle Quilts - Lynette asked that cradle quilts be no more than 20"x20" this year. Book bags (for a recorder & music book) will be given out by the Tulare Co. Symphony to students in grades 3-5 at rural schools. Lynette has the book bag instructions.

9 a.m.-12 noon, all are invited.


- Local Heroes Sheri reported Jan and her sister Jill donated back to us their dad's Local Heroes quilt. Several tops are ready to be quilted.

What the participants should bring:

- 1. Sewing Machine with regular foot and possible decorative stitches.
- 2. If doing the edge in the class: a denim or "heavy duty" needle
- 3. If doing the edge in the class: an edge stitch foot or overcasting presser foot if you don't have one of these, you can use Sue's machine
- 4. Thread 28-40 wt.
- 5. A postcard is 4" x 6", so a plain piece of fabric for the backing (the side on which you write). Your fabric piece should be at least 5" x 7"
- 6. Top fabric that is also at least 5" x 7" Choose from:
 - a. A delightful pattern, or
 - b. A section from a quilt or ? that you are willing to cut up, or
 - c, Heavier plain fabric you would like to paint on, or (see what Sue is bringing #8 below).
 - d. Paper piece a design (at least 5" x 7")
- 7. Thin batting, if you want your postcard to have a quilted look.

Sue is bringing the following if you don't want to lug your machine or other goodies:

- 1. Her Brother sewing machine that has the special edge foot. If you don't want to lug a machine you are welcome to use hers for a quick quilting and/or edging on your postcard.
- 2. The stiff stabilizer cut to 4" x 6" for each of you.
- 3. Misty fuse.
- 4. Glues.
- 5. Paints and fabric markers.
- 6. Some embellishments.
- 7. Drawing pens and pencils.
- 8. A fabric paper you can paint on.
- 9. An iron and pressing board.

You can find tutorials on You Tube ahead of time to help you picture what you will be doing. I like one on Saroy.net.

The purpose of the Porterville Quilters Club is to create, stimulate, maintain, and record an interest in all matters pertaining to the making, collecting and preserving of quilts and to establish and promote educational and philanthropic endeavors through quilts.

Next school year, the classrooms of rural Tulare County will echo with the sound of "Recorder music". Recorders are small flute-like musical instruments, and you are invited to join in the fun of making cloth bags for them in our Recorder Bag Project!


In the 2023-24 school year, the Sequoia Symphony Orchestra and the Tulare County Office of Education are partnering to bring the Link Up program to Tulare County's rural schools. Link Up is a youth music program developed by Carnegie Hall and offered to over 600,000 students in 40 states and 9 countries annually. As part of the Link Up curriculum 3rd-5th grade Tulare County students will receive a music book and a recorder instrument. They will be taught to play several songs which they will perform alongside the Sequoia Symphony Orchestra in a special concert during the orchestra's 65th season next spring.

During the Link Up program, our local students will need a bag to carry and keep their music books and recorders safe as they transport them to and from their classes. So, over the next few months we will be sewing these special bags and they will be made available to participating students when the program begins this Fall.

Kid's Book Bag Instructions





Pocket = Cut fabric 12" x 7"

Handles = Cut two - 3" x 12"

1. Pocket-top of pocket

Fold down 1/4", fold down again 1", press and stitch down Open bag and measure 1-1/2" from fold line Place bottom of pocket on the 1-1/2" mark Pin bottom and sides of pocket to bag Stitch stich bottom of pocket to the bag Mark pocket at center (from top to bottom) Stitch center and sides of pocket to bag to create two smaller pockets.

2. Bag - Sew side seams (French seams)

Pin wrong sides together, stitch 1/8" seam Turn bag right side out; sew second 1/2" seam down both sides

3. Handles – On each handle

Sew right sides together, leave ends open Turn so seam is in the middle, press

4. Bag - Top of bag

Turn down 1/2" and turn again 1", press, pin

- 5. Handles Mark 3" from each side seam
 Centered at 3" marks, slip each end of handle 1/2" into double turn-down and pin
 With center of handle in bag, stitch around bottom of turn down
 Repeat with other handle
- 6. Finish top Flip handles out of bag
 With handles out, top stitch around top of bag
 Reinforce connection point of the handles with cross stitches
