Quit of Valor Update: Ellen Jordan gave a most interesting and informative presentation in which she presented the blocks that the members had completed for the Quilt of Valor and explained in detail the history of each block. Following the meeting, members assembled the blocks into the quilt tops.

Turned Edge, Invisible Applique: September's Workshop with Juanita Cairns

A technique workshop will be taught by Juanita Cairns during the September 16th workshop. In this class you will learn to do turned edge appliqué for machine appliqué. You will have a choice of two ways to learn. First, you may do the full project. If that's your choice, you will need to purchase the pattern called "Postcards from the Past" by The Rabbit Factory (available at Calico Mermaid). Or you may use a simple design that Juanita will provide to learn the technique and make a sample square.

# For either choice, you will need the following supplies:

- 1. Stabilizer such as Sharon Schamber's Secret foundation. (Juanita will provide a square for anyone who needs it. The stabilizer can also be purchased at the Calico Mermaid.)
- 2. An ironing surface and iron.
- 3. A piece of freezer paper to work on.
- 4. Washable Elmer's School glue bottle and stick.

## **Quilts of Valor**

Ellen Jordan presented a program on quilt blocks that were popular during the Civil War era at the July meeting. Ellen had volunteers make sample blocks, which were displayed while she gave a brief explanation of the block's history and meaning. The featured blocks were used by The Underground Railroad to signal messages to Railroad conductors leading runaway slaves north to freedom. For example, the sailboat meant a passage by boat, Jacob's ladder meant a climb of some sort, and the wagon wheel meant a ride hidden in a wagon. Well done, Ellen and quilters!


The Civil War blocks presentation was informative, entertaining, and appreciated by the Porterville Quilters' Club members.

Below and at right: Noeleen Paskweitz completed a log cabin curved heart wall hanging and Karen Andris shared her colorful larger-than-king-size quilt.





- Turned Edge, Invisible Applique: September's Workshop (Continued from Page 2)
  - 5. A cuticle stick or stiletto to push
  - 6. Liquid stitch. (Only liquid stitch not Unique stitch.)
  - 7. Small appliqué scissors.
  - 8. Polyester Monofilament

thread.

- 9. Bobbin wound with monofilament or 50 wt. thread to match your background.
- 10. 70/11 size needles.
- 11. Sewing machine in good working order with an open toe foot.
- 12. Background fabric. If using the Rabbit Factory pattern refer to size on pattern. Otherwise, bring about a 16 inch square.
- 13. Batting the size of the background fabric.
- 14. Miscellaneous pieces of colorful fabrics. These can be scraps.

If you have a light box bring it. One will be provided, but for the sake of time, bring yours.
